Course Description

Catalog Description

Directed readings and research leading to a thesis paper under one or more members of the department. Prerequisites: senior majors in philosophy or senior non-major, submission in advance of an outline of proposed research; permission of proposed director and department chair. Repeatable for a maximum of 6 units provided a different topic is covered, but only one attempt will count towards the major requirements.

Course Objectives

The purpose of this course is to expose students to a variety of questions about Plato's *Republic*. We will read it in its entirety and some secondary sources that elaborate on the myths present in it. We will also read Aristotle's critique from his own *Politics*.

Course Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will have had an introduction to ancient Greek philosophy. They will also learn to construct and assess arguments for philosophical positions. Doing so will strengthen their critical thinking skills in all disciplines and even outside of academic life.

Course Requirements

There will be three 2-page papers (each worth 15% of the final grade) and a final 10-15-page paper (worth 45%). Participation and attendance will account for the final 10%.
